Toowoomba Health Pathway for recently arrived Humanitarian entrants.

Refugees enter Australia as permanent residents under the Humanitarian Settlement Program (HSP). All new arrivals will access a refugee health assessment which includes a nursing and medical assessment. Every refugee under the HSP has a Medicare number and will receive a Medicare and Health Care card within 6 weeks of arrival. Visa numbers include 200, 201, 202, 203, 204.

Case Managers (CM) support new arrivals to settle from arrival up to 18 months (depending on need). Clients will start a comprehensive health assessment within 28 days of their arrival to Australia. All clients are referred directly to Kobi Place. CMs receive Health Alerts from Department of Social Services (DSS) and if clients have critical or urgent health needs on arrival, Multicultural Australia Refugee Health nurse will assist referral to appropriate health services, within 24 - 72 hours.

NOTE: If a patient is seen at a General Practice for urgent health needs before going to Kobi Place, the refugee health assessment should only be commenced post the Kobi Place screening.

At completion of these appointments

Multicultural Australia and Kobi Place coordinate the Refugee Health Assessment in Primary Care. Multicultural Australia tells Kobi Place which Practice patient is booked for their health assessment. Based on this information Kobi Place transfers clinical patient record to General Practice (via fax or electronic transfer).

General Practice

All new arrivals should have a refugee health assessment in primary care, ideally post the Kobi Place assessment/screening. The Kobi Place refugee health assessment does not replace a primary care assessment. GPs are encouraged to use the clinical information provided by Kobi Place to inform the MBS health assessment items (701, 703,705 and 707). A full medical examination and assessment of chronic health issues are part of the refugee health assessment in primary care.

VACCINATIONS: New access arrangements under the National Immunisation Program provide free catchup vaccines. Refugees are entitled to QHealth funded catch-up vaccinations and can be included as part of regular QHIP orders.
